

Hello All!

We will be entering into a period of time the Methodist and other Christian denominations (such as Catholic, etc.) call "Advent"

Advent is a noun and comes from the Latin, meaning "come into", as Jesus came into the world for us. It is a time of preparation for the coming of Christ.



During this special time, the church Methodist has traditionally used an "Advent Wreath" to help mark this time of preparation. I was unsure of the history of the Advent Wreath myself, but it seems that it was started by German Lutherans in the 16th century as a spiritual preparation, but it wasn't until 3 centuries later that the modern advent wreath came to be. Johann Hinrich Wichem, a German theologian, is credited with lighting an increasing number of candles we near Christmas. as Wichem was "passionate about urging Christians to minister to the physical and social, as well as spiritual, needs of peoples. He, himself, founded a home for poor children, the Rough

House, in the city of Hamburg. As Christmas approached, the children would inquire about its arrival. In 1839, Wichem thought to use a wreath as a teaching tool. For every other day in between, Wichern placed a small red candle in the wreath. Each day, Wichern would light a candle and teach the children about Jesus. The idea was a success." Liberty Church, has consistently paid in-full the outreach apportionments that are recommended for financial aid by the Texas Conference. The congregation has also been generous in support of numerous local, national, even international outreaches. One such organization which receives continuing financial support from Liberty members is:

Children's Hope Chest

Children's Hope Chest exists to glorify God by releasing the potential of orphaned and impoverished children and their communities. CHC does this through partnerships that cultivate sustainable two-way transformation. Based in Colorado Springs, CHC was founded by a group of businessmen in 1992. The organization has active on-going relationships in seven foreign countries including Russia, Moldova, India, Ethiopia, Uganda, Swaziland and Guatemala. Ken Sparks, son of Liberty members John & Ann Sparks, has served as President and CEO of Children's Hope Chest since February 2014.

CHC engages in a long-term, community-to-community partnership that:

Empower local leaders to provide food, medical care and hope to their communities, while sharing the Gospel.

Support partnering communities as they engage with overseas communities to create sustainable transformation using healthy international development practices.

Address the complex causes of poverty, including material, spiritual, emotional, social, economic and educational needs.

Transform the lives of children and their communities through a focus on sustainability, independence and long-term selfsufficiency.

Transform the lives of the partnering community members through exposure, education, relationship, service, and perhaps most importantly, instilling hope.

Working together with large Mega Churches and their members, CHC and these partnering Churches and their individual members develop and support master plans to serve these CarePoint communities with the Church addressing capital financial needs such as those related to clean water, nutrition, education and basic medical care while the individual members of these Churches participate in CHC's child sponsorship program.

Sponsored Children are: 27-40% more likely to finish secondary education; 80% more likely to complete university education; 30-75% more likely to become community leaders as adults, and 40-70% more likely to become church leaders.

As reported last month, a quilt made by our "Crafty Christians" was the featured item for a fund raiser for the Rainbow Room and other charitable outreaches of our two congregations. The winning ticket was held by Martha Gould, a Liberty member. The Rainbow Room serves Wood County's fostered, neglected and abused children. The organization has long been the recipient of communion hand rail offerings from both of our churches.
