YOUTH & CHILDREN NEWS

As parents and grandparents, we all want the best for our children and grandchildren. We strive to provide them with love, support, and guidance as they navigate the journey of growing up and maturing. One of the most important ways we can support our children is by providing them with genuine and meaningful conversation and encouragement. Encouragement plays a vital role in a child's development, shaping their self-esteem, resilience, and overall well-being.

Reality is that encouragement is more than just praising a child for their accomplishments. It involves providing them with conversations that offer the emotional support and confidence they need to face challenges and pursue their goals. When children feel encouraged, they are more likely to develop a positive outlook on life and a belief in their own abilities. This foundation of self-assurance can carry them through the ups and downs of life, empowering them to take on new experiences and overcome obstacles.

Providing children the opportunity to voice their opinions, their fears, concerns, and disappointments allows them to develop the skills needed to communicate their desires and needs. This is done to teach children that there is an appropriate way to express themselves and offer another solution rather than hide themselves in the screens of today.

One of the key aspects of encouragement is the emphasis on effort rather than innate ability. When children are praised for their hard work, determination, and perseverance, they learn that their actions and attitudes are what truly matter. This mindset fosters a willingness to take on challenges and learn from setbacks, rather than being discouraged by the fear of failure. As a result, children become more resilient and adaptable, traits that are essential for success in both academic and real-world settings.

I am not advocating that every child deserves a trophy. However, every child deserves the opportunity to attempt whatever desire they choose. Our role is to nurture that with realistic expectations and be there for them when they discover they won't be the next major league player.

It is parental encouragement that helps children develop a healthy sense of self-worth and confidence. When parents, grandparents, and other caregivers provide sincere words of support, children internalize these messages and begin to see themselves in a positive light. This positive self-image can shield them from the negative effects of criticism and rejection, enabling them to maintain a strong sense of self-esteem even in the face of adversity.

In addition to building confidence, positive conversation and encouragement also strengthen the parent-child bond. When children feel genuinely supported by their parents, they are more likely to seek guidance and share their thoughts and feelings openly. This open line of communication fosters a strong and trusting relationship, allowing parents to provide the guidance and mentorship their children need as they navigate the complexities of childhood and adolescence.

Church, this is where many of our children and youth among the community crave to be. In a safe and encouraging environment. Your words, demeanor, attitude, high-fives, pats on the back, all seem insignificant but to some young person, that is absolute gold.

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As we consider the profound impact of encouragement on a child's development, it becomes clear that this form of support is a powerful tool for nurturing happy, confident, and resilient individuals. By fostering a culture of encouragement in our homes, our church, and our community, we can empower our children to embrace challenges, pursue their passions, and cultivate a strong sense of self-worth. In doing so, we equip them with the skills and mindset they need to thrive in an ever-changing world.

I have seen this in action here at FUMC Quitman. The adults have been so quick to interact with our children and youth to make them feel comfortable. One of our kids told me several weeks ago after engaging with one of the adults, "He made me feel like I was the only one in the room." It is moments like this that places value in the connection of our church.

I believe it is one of our sacred duties as adults, and especially as leaders, parents and grandparents, to protect the children in our lives. They are weak, vulnerable, and impressionable and God has given us the responsibility of guarding them. It is witnessed, unfortunately, in too many instances of such failure to protect but instead to neglect or betray. The physical, emotional, mental, and spiritual damage that occurs when this happens can be catastrophic. Let us commit ourselves to stand guard and protect our children and their friends where needed. If we can't be there physically, may we escort them to the One who is their fortress and defender.

God, we pray now over our children and those in their circle of influence. We ask that You would hide them in the shelter of Your presence. God, please keep every child safe from those who would conspire against them. With Your help and wisdom may we do our part to keep them safe—physically, mentally, emotionally, and spiritually. Lord, give us the strength and love to stand as their guardians, defenders, and shepherds as we imitate You in those roles. Would that we, as a church, forever be mindful of the children and their friends that we encounter in our daily lives. May we always see them as Your image bearers.

We pray this in Jesus' holy name. Amen.
